The history of the Potawatomi and the relocation of the Prairie Band to Kansas is a story that has been recounted in published sources which provide the history of the tribe from prehistoric contact through recent years. What has not been recounted until now, is the administrative process that guided this experience, that is, the operations within the agency which involved the agent and the Potawatomi. The purpose of this thesis is to facilitate access and encourage historical inquiry into these documentary resources.

The body of evidence in the official record of the Potawatomi Agency document incidents, routine experiences both important and prosaic, in Potawatomi history, and how their culture and way of life changed. These records and this study offer a different perspective from other Potawatomi studies. With its availability, researchers may find either additional support for, or challenges to, the assumptions about the Prairie Potawatomi and their life on the reservation in Kansas.

This thesis was undertaken as part of a pioneering cooperative effort between Emporia State University's Master of Arts Program in American History and the National Archives and Records Administration-Central Plains Region (NARA-CPR), in Kansas

City, Missouri. The thesis is based on the assemblance of primary sources from seventy-five cubic feet of archival holdings. The process included the systematic and comprehensive appraisal, arrangement, and description of the records revealing the application of government policy and its effect on the lives of the Prairie Potawatomi. The inventory forms the most significant portion of a study laying the foundation for original interpretative historical inquiry. This inventory and a derivative interpretive history will be published by NARA as a guide to these records and will be distributed for research use to the agency's patrons. As such, this work is an original contribution to the history of the Potawatomi and the Office of Indian Affairs.

A traditional thesis seeks out primary sources and material organized for the researcher's use. This project involved the additional elements of preparation of materials and interdisciplinary study. In this instance, all Potawatomi material in the custody of NARA-CPR has been prepared for the use of scholars. This thesis is an example of the systematic work that must be done in order for other researchers to use primary source materials. This sort of project provides students with the opportunity to work with original documents, to learn the intricate procedures of records' management, and to write an administrative history.

As NARA inventory, this thesis must be edited and revised prior to publication. The final publication will conform to NARA's standards. The standardized format is intentional, and designed to limit confusion on the part of the researching public.

An official administrative history is also included with the inventory. It is a product of deliberate standardized format for the reasons stated above. This stylistic presentation is intentional as well, so that a uniform level of information is provided for

research use. In other words, what is included, is included deliberately; what is left out is left out deliberately. Therefore, the “history” speaks to a narrow perspective, a Federal point of view, and the records speak for themselves in support of the interpretation presented.






Fig. 1 Based on Map Drawn By Captain Seth Eastman of Kansas Territory in 1854 showing locations of Indian Reserves, and Remaining Indian Reservations in 1875

## **Introduction**

The Potawatomi Indians were a medium sized tribe if compared to other North American tribes, and typical in a number of ways. Their way of life was typical of eastern woodland tribes; typical in their language, a dialect of Algonquian; and typical in that they were one of many tribes relocated to reservations under the Removal Acts passed by the United States Government.

This study focuses on the Potawatomi of Kansas, hereafter referred to as the Prairie Potawatomi, or Prairie Band. After being displaced from their ancestral homeland and removed to the Indian Territory of what would become the State of Kansas, many of the Potawatomi were also pressured to move to Oklahoma. Resistance and perseverance by the Prairie Band of Potawatomi secured for them a permanent presence in Kansas, even though some Potawatomi moved to Oklahoma, Canada, or back to the Great Lakes region.

The Potawatomi were relocated to a reservation in Eastern Kansas under Federal authority. Their reservation, although not the largest reserve, was substantial enough that a typical mix of programs was provided for the tribe to help them assimilate into American culture. Surviving records of the Potawatomi Agency reveal the relationship between the Potawatomi people and the Office of Indian Affairs (OIA) during a difficult period of adjustment. These original sources provide a unique perspective on the

application of Federal Indian policy, and the administration of a typical tribe that settled in Kansas.

The systematic removal of Indians from tribal homelands was a pivotal event in Native-American history. Removal Acts, passed by the United States Congress during the 1830's, ultimately led to the relocation of numerous tribes, including the Potawatomi, onto reservations scattered across the United States.

The motives of the government in promoting its removal policies were primarily intended to avoid conflict. As drastic as the removal measures were, the records documenting the administration of the Potawatomi, especially after their relocation to Kansas, appear to reflect a strong adherence to ideological underpinnings of Thomas Jefferson's vision of the "Agrarian Dream" and its close linkage to the Removal Policy. The inevitable expansion of white settlements and the clear potential for conflict between the settlers and the tribes onto whose land they intruded, had been repeated often enough during the earlier colonial period to provide observers with a well developed idea about the hostilities that often accompanied America's westward expansion.<sup>1</sup>

Jefferson's plan for the removal of Indian tribes was born of his belief that they were situated in the direct path of white settlement. The region west of the Mississippi River was generally perceived as relatively uninhabited. At the same time, a pattern of white settlement based on the Jeffersonian concept of the "yeoman farmer" prospering in an agrarian utopia emerged. This vision of America was seen as applicable to American

Indians, but only if their assimilation into white culture could be encouraged.<sup>2</sup>

The surviving records of the Potawatomi Agency reveal evidence of official programs, and their application, success, and failure which paralleled the experience of many other tribes. These records can be analyzed for evidence as the attempt by the government to extend the promise of the Jeffersonian Agrarian dream to indigenous peoples within the republic.

## Origins, Migration, and Removal

The Potawatomi, known as People of the Places of Fire, is part of the greater linguistic family of Algonquian speaking peoples of North America.<sup>3</sup> The historic range or homeland of the Potawatomi was centered in the Great Lakes region in what is now the states of Wisconsin and Michigan. By 1640, around the time that white contact was first recorded, Potawatomi were present in large numbers near present-day Green Bay, Wisconsin. At that time they were considered one tribe, although they later divided into several sub-bands, and periodic migrations caused in part by internal conflicts within the tribe led to various degrees of separation. As a result of periodic relocation, the tribe split and branched from the original clan, but would often regroup in Wisconsin.<sup>4</sup> The advancement of whites into the Great Lakes region during the settlement of the “Old Northwest” created situations resulting in policies that ultimately relocated the entire tribe west of the Mississippi River.<sup>5</sup> When the pressure of white settlement from the east reached a critical level. Early in the 1830's, the tribe split again with sub-bands migrating into Indiana and Iowa. With the promulgation of the Removal Acts in the 1830's, the

Potawatomi realized any chance of ever becoming a reunited people was unlikely.<sup>6</sup> As white settlement continued, many of the Potawatomi began a long migration to the south and west. By 1845, Kansas was their new homeland.

Migration contributed to the tribe breaking into a number of bands, including the Forest Potawatomi, the Council Bluffs or “Bluffs” Potawatomi, the Citizen Band, the Mission or “Christian” Band, and the “Prairie People” or the “Prairie Band” who relocated to Kansas. Some of the Forest Potawatomi moved into Canada to avoid the government, along with its removal and relocation policies, others moved into the area near present day Council Bluffs, Iowa, and thereafter were known as the “Bluffs” band. While most of this Bluffs band resided in Iowa (attempting to resist the inevitable relocation to Kansas under military order), some of its members moved back to their native land in the Great Lakes. However, not all of the Bluffs band were forcibly removed from those lands by the military; some volunteered to move<sup>7</sup>.

Following the purchase of the Louisiana Territory from France, and after the cessation of hostilities with Britain in the War of 1812, the United States government continued the long process of dealing with the multitude of tribes within the states and territories. Some of these tribes had remained neutral or friendly to the United States during the war, while others had actively aided the British. Measures taken to pacify and remove hostile tribes, along with neutral and friendly tribes, accompanied the settlement

of the Old Northwest and the newly acquired Louisiana Territory.<sup>8</sup> Similar determinations were made in the south for the Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Creek, and Seminole tribes. This relocation process was one of the first steps taken toward a full-scale reservation policy.<sup>9</sup> The government's ultimate plan was to remove and settle the Potawatomi west of the Mississippi River. The Treaty of 1846 provided for a reservation in Kansas as compensation for land the tribe had ceded in Wisconsin and Michigan. As part of their treaty agreement, the Potawatomi would also give up their land in Iowa and move to Indian Territory, which would later become the state of Kansas.<sup>10</sup>

After their arrival in Kansas, the Potawatomi joined other Indian nations that likewise had been relocated to the "Indian Territory." Land that was originally home to the Kansa, People of the Wind, was now divided among such tribes as the Shawnee, the Delaware, the Munsee, the Quindaro, the Wyandotte, the Kickapoo, the Iowa, and the Sac and Fox. The Potawatomi were originally given 576,000 acres of the eastern portion of the Kansas Reserve that straddled the Kansas River more than 600 miles from their historic tribal homeland. This movement, though traumatic for the people and their culture, should not be directly compared with the Trail of Tears experiences of southern tribes such as the Cherokee, the Creek, or the Choctaw. Indeed there is evidence that a significant number of Potawatomi at the time of migration were willing to resettle.<sup>11</sup>

Once known as part of the “Great American Desert,” Kansas, like the earlier Northwest territory, became the scene of increasing levels of white settlement. Commissioner George W. Manypenny, between 1853-1854, wrote several treaties, now known as the Manypenny Treaties, that set aside thirteen million acres of land for the Indian tribes in Kansas.<sup>12</sup> Although the land had been officially reserved for the Indians, including the Potawatomi, a large amount of the land ultimately was sold to white settlers who, within a short period of time, surrounded the entire Potawatomi Reservation.<sup>13</sup>

James A. Clifton stated that “The purpose of the Removal Policy was meant to establish a permanent Indian Frontier. . .to contain American expansionism while protecting relocated tribes from damaging contacts with the frontier.”<sup>14</sup> In 1854, Kansas became a territory, an event that coincided with the end of the Removal Policy.<sup>15</sup>

Removal was conducted at considerable expense of public funds and resources. It involved significant planning and control, and the active participation of the military. For the Potawatomi, removal signaled major changes in their old way of life, as they made the difficult transition from a free, migratory existence to a life of confinement on an Indian reservation.

## **Reservation Life in Kansas**

The Potawatomi arrived in Kansas, ca. 1833-1835, and initially settled with the Kickapoo near Leavenworth, Kansas, prior to placement on their reservation in Jackson County in 1845. In order to manage Indian affairs in a specified area, the government established within the Office of Indian Affairs (OIA) administrative units known as “Superintendencies.” Each superintendency was administered by a Superintendent, locally known as the “Indian Agent.”

The first superintendency established in the new Louisiana Territory was the Missouri superintendency, followed by the Northern and Central Superintendencies. The Potawatomi Agency was assigned to the Central Superintendency in 1851. Getting to that point was an involved and complicated matter since the process corresponded with the continuing evolution of the OIA and Federal Indian Policy. At that time, the majority of the Prairie Band had moved to the vicinity of Council Bluffs, Iowa. Other tribes, including the Wyandotte, Kickapoo, Munsee, Iowa, Sac and Fox, and Shawnee were also involved in treaty, removal, and relocation negotiations with the United States. These tribes, some historically friendly to the Potawatomi, and others not, shortly found themselves close neighbors, settled into adjacent reserves and administered under a basically unified authority charged with providing fair administration of interests for each of the tribes, thus setting the destinies of the tribes along parallel paths. The Central

Superintendency was abolished in 1878, and the Potawatomi agent thereafter reported directly to the Office of Indian Affairs in Washington, D. C. In 1882, the Great Nemaha Agency consolidated with the Potawatomi to form the Potawatomi and Great Nemaha Agency. This combined agency which supervised the affairs of the Iowa, and Sac and Fox tribes continued until July 1, 1903, at which time the Potawatomi Indian School and Agency took over responsibility. On May 1, 1903, the Kickapoo Indian School and Agency was made responsible for the Kickapoo, Iowa and Sac and Fox tribes, leaving the Potawatomi School and Agency responsible for Potawatomi affairs.<sup>16</sup>

The location of the Agency headquarters has changed frequently over the years, apparently established at times near the residence of the agent or superintendent, and perhaps at their discretion. Headquarter cities have included Rossville, Lawrence, Nadeau, St. Mary's, Hoyt, Horton, and Mayetta, Kansas. The headquarters of the Potawatomi Agency has traditionally been associated with Mayetta, Kansas, a site to which it moved after the tribal school was abolished following a fire in 1908. However, on June 2, 1919, the Potawatomi and Kickapoo functions were consolidated with the Kickapoo Indian Agency with new and current administrative offices at Horton, Kansas.<sup>17</sup>

The biggest problem facing the tribe involved adjustment to the policies imposed by the United States government, including the requirement that they abandon their

traditional ways of life. They were encouraged to become farmers, educate their children in government operated or mission schools, adopt the dress and social mannerisms of white America, embrace Christianity, learn English, become citizens, and to prosper on their allotted acres of land under the direction of an Indian Agent.

Until 1861, all Potawatomi who relocated onto the Kansas reservation were referred to collectively as the Prairie Band. But this band eventually split into sub-bands, each pursuing individual dealings in their relations with the United States authorities.<sup>18</sup>

The Prairie Band became notorious for its resistance to government policies and proposals. Its members resisted the changes that resulted in the reduction of the original reservation and fought to retain and defend the integrity of their remaining 77,358 acres. On November 15, 1861, a new, smaller reservation was carved out of the original 576,000 acres. The diminished Potawatomi reserve occupied approximately eleven square miles located in the center of Jackson County, Kansas. Ironically, members of a sub-band, the Citizen Potawatomi, were collectively allotted almost twice as much acreage, 152,128 acres, because the government saw them as having progressed further down the road to independence and assimilation.<sup>19</sup>

Part of the assimilation process involved the work of missionaries. At one time, the Potawatomi Agency had two missions, each seeking to Christianize the tribe. Those Potawatomi who abandoned their native spiritual traditions in favor of Christianity came

of life. A sense of unremitting confinement was something the Potawatomi found especially distressful. An annual buffalo hunt on the Kansas prairie and the promised legal title to a reservation could not compensate for the loss of independence, especially for a people who now found themselves indisputably dependent. In their old homeland the Potawatomi supported themselves by fishing and hunting. In Kansas, limits on their movement, inexperience with farming in a new and distant region, and acculturation, in general, contributed to the marginal existence that characterized tribal life during early reservation years. After years of trying, and not many successful crop years, the agent requested special relief funds to assist the Potawatomi with their most critical needs. Later, in order to raise additional funds to help support the tribe, the OIA authorized the agent to administer the leasing of Potawatomi land to white Kansans.<sup>24</sup>

As lands west of the Mississippi River opened for settlement, the coming of the railroad signaled the arrival of the industrial east. Even though the Potawatomi had been granted a reservation for their tribe, they were informed by the government that certain lands would be set aside for railroad easement. Exactly how this proposal was received by the tribes is not recorded, but confusion and bewilderment would certainly have been evident. The government's position was to promote the coming of the railroad as a decidedly positive development that was beneficial for progress and prosperity. Yet, once again, land that had been promised for exclusive use of the Potawatomis was now to be shared with a distant, faceless corporate entity.

The Leavenworth, Pawnee, & Western Railroad was required, by the Potawatomi treaty of 1861, to build and complete the railroad through the reservation during a nine years period. Any nontimber damage done to the reservation during construction was to be paid by the railroad. "All treaties specified that any default by the railroad interest, or principal, or any change in construction schedules would result in a forfeit of the land. But the Potawatomi received bonds rather than cash-bonds in payment for their land by the railroad companies, leaving the Tribe's fortune dependent upon the success of the railroad."<sup>25</sup>

The Potawatomi reservation, along with many other reservations, was assigned to a Superintendency, with an Indian agent or superintendent appointed by the Office of Indian Affairs (OIA). If the spirit of official written policy is taken at face value, the responsibility of this local official as "agent," was to act as the advocate for the tribe, manage development, and protect tribal interests.

Agents and superintendents formed a unique and important cadre of government officials who shouldered a heavy responsibility for the administration and supervision of an equally important government office. Agents were on the front lines of implementation of OIA policy, and their actions often determined whether relations between the U.S. government and the tribes were friendly, hostile, constructive, productive, or controversial. An Indian agent held tremendous power over the lives and economies of the people and their tribes, and functioned as the principal liaison for the

tribes, to both the federal government and private sector. The scope of their responsibility encompassed nearly everything that would normally be associated with the administration of public services in a county-sized governmental entity. Responsibilities included: the maintenance of roads and utilities; managing a sizeable and complex budget; taking yearly censuses; recording births, deaths, and even marriages. The agent supervised a sizeable number of employees who had their own complex set of responsibilities. They were all directly answerable to the OIA, and less formally answerable to the tribal government and its membership.

Indian agents were an educated professional class of civil servants, almost exclusively male until recent years. They earned a respectable but not excessive salary. Regularly transferred from one agency or field installation to another, the careers of agents can be traced from the records of numerous Indian agencies and schools. Managing the affairs of Indians for either the OIA, and later the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), agents often found themselves in the middle of volatile controversies. More often though they contended with the everyday tedium of bureaucracy, and with maintaining personal relations with individual tribal members. As the principal representative of the OIA, the agents were ultimately held accountable. In dealing with inquiries and complaints, they were, for the most part, professional in their actions.

At times the work of the Indian agent was a thankless job. Agents were expected to run the reservations and take care of any problems that arose. In the annual reports prepared by the agent for the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, complaints often were not reported. Rather, it was more common for the agent to emphasize the positive. In 1882,

Agent H. C. Linn remarked “I think the Indians are making some improvements both mentally and morally . . . we are gradually turning their thoughts into other channels.”<sup>26</sup>

Indian Agent I. W. Patrick stated on September 15, 1886, that they “are a happy people.”<sup>27</sup> From his perspective, his statements were accurate and truthful, and in line with the objectives of the OIA, i.e., to assist and encourage the progress of the tribe toward assimilation. From an individual point of view, matters were normally seen as well in hand, but available records reveal frequent complaints filed by individual reservation Potawatomi.

Routine correspondence present in subject correspondence files maintained by agents reveal much more about the day-to-day life on the reservation. Letters of correspondence contain criticism of agents for not making themselves readily available to hear the concerns of the tribes. Correspondence also details frequent incidents between tribal members and neighboring whites, minor for the most part, that tell much about daily reservation life. In one letter, the agent describes actions he intends to take following an assault on an Indian girl at the train station at Rossville, and his intention to bring to justice the scoundrel who committed it. In another, the agent found himself caught in the middle of, of all things, a dispute over the sale of lemonade on the

reservation. A local entrepreneur had, apparently, obtained a license or what he believed to be an exclusive franchise to sell lemonade and other beverages at various locations on the reservation. When resident Potawatomi set up their own stands during annual fairs and other events, this businessman lodged an official complaint directed at the agent.<sup>28</sup>

By the turn of the century, the agents reported remarkable progress among the Potawatomi: most spoke English instead of their native language; more children attended school; crops were larger and more profitable than before; many Indians had converted to Christianity, some even severed formal/official tribal membership in the tribe and took on United States citizenship. In 1905, Superintendent G. L. Williams remarked that “the marks of the savage are rapidly disappearing.” The old culture of the Potawatomi was swiftly dissolving.<sup>29</sup>

During the first years after their arrival on the reservation, living conditions did not improve greatly, but by the mid-1860's, significant changes were noticeable: an agency school was established and enrollment was growing; St. Mary's Mission School was in operation; some men had enlisted in the military; and farming techniques and production had advanced since their arrival to the reservation. Those changes were cited

as proof that the Potawatomi were assimilating into the white culture.<sup>30</sup>

Among the most pervasive and unresolved problems affecting progress and improvement among the Potawatomi were alcohol and gambling. The use of alcohol was seen by government representatives as by far the most serious challenge. It was no secret to various agents that the Potawatomi's white neighbors sold whiskey to reservation residents.<sup>31</sup> The Potawatomi Agency's Police Record Book lists numerous misdemeanors and crimes committed by Potawatomi on the reservation and most involved alcohol. The correspondence of agents includes numerous references that confirm and document the problem.

The physical layout and administration of an Indian reservation was a large operation. Issues associated with land policy, land use, distribution and ownership dominate much of the administration of the reservation. Among the most controversial programs were the allotment process and distribution of annuities. Allotments were individual parcels of land surveyed and assigned to enrolled members of the tribe, on which they lived, farmed, and became self-sufficient.

To speed that process, in 1887, President Grover Cleveland signed the Dawes, or General Allotment Act, designed to split the communal tribal holdings into individually owned farms. That would require each adult reservation dweller to become an independent operator, at least in economic terms. . . In fact, most studies of individual tribes depict the years between 1880 and 1920 as the nadir of the Indian experience as populations declined and disease swept through the

malnourished people.<sup>32</sup>

Allotment records identify exact sections of land received by the individuals including inherited tracts and land that became combined property due to marriage.

In 1886, the Potawatomi had approximately \$640,000 held in trust, and the interest was paid out in annuities. The funds were intended for the purchase of food and supplies required for self-sufficiency.<sup>33</sup> An annuity was an annual payment of money from United States Reservation Funds owed to individual Indians under treaty provisions. By 1870, the economic situation of the Potawatomis had declined to the point that they were almost entirely dependent on the annuity checks. Payments were administered as Individual Indian Money (IIM) disbursements and recorded in IIM ledger books that document the transfer of U. S. Treasury funds for distribution by the agent or superintendent.

Administration of the Potawatomi reservation required numerous employees in addition to the agent and his administrative staff. These included teachers, blacksmiths, laundresses, cooks, wheelwrights, field matrons, physicians, police, and the agency or reservation "farmer." Lists of these positions, salaries, and length of service, are recorded in a register of employees, providing a good sense of the people and activities required to

keep a reservation in operation from year to year. The perennial need for a permanent physician is evident in other agency records, documenting evidence of chronic illnesses, epidemics, and chronic conditions such as trachoma and tuberculosis.

Another key employee was the “agency farmer,” an OIA official in charge of reservation agricultural policy, who exercised commanding influence over important aspects of the reservation economy which directly affected the lives of the Indian inhabitants. The agency farmer was usually well trained in agricultural science. Occasionally agency farmers acted as de-facto assistants to the agent in official functions, and some assisted the superintendent in administrative capacities far removed from agriculture. The farmer communicated frequently with Indians on everyday business matters and wrote letters for those who could not write English.

Both the agency and individual Indians possessing land allotments leased lands to white agriculturalists for grazing and farming. Official administration of this process was a practical measure; contracts were involved as well as public funds; and numerous Potawatomi lived elsewhere, in “absentee” status, which officially meant on another reservation. The individual was still considered a member of the Potawatomi tribe unless all formal ties with the tribe were severed. Reservation lands could not legally be leased without official OIA permission. The OIA supervised a variety of lease programs that put the land to productive use. At the same time, this practice raised revenue for the tribe and individuals. These funds were held in trust and periodically distributed to entitled parties. In some cases, the recipients were minors or inheritors of the land, and disbursement of the funds was made accordingly.

The Indian education system was an institution of immense significance and cultural influence, and a vital part of assimilation policy. There were two Indian schools administered by the Potawatomi agency. One, located near the Kickapoo reservation, was known as the Kickapoo Training School. The other, southwest of Mayetta on the Potawatomi reservation, was the Potawatomi Boarding School. These institutions drew students from a number of day schools, but, throughout the agency's history, many Potawatomi children routinely attended schools that were part of the area public school system. Those who attended Indian schools received an education based heavily on manual and vocational training. Education records provide evidence that some of the girls were sent to neighboring white families on and off the reservation to learn how to "keep house." At the same time, boys were taught the ways of farming. Teaching domestic and manual work was one way to eliminate old ways and assimilate the Potawatomi. Photographs included in family statistical records and in health survey records in the 1920's reveal that Potawatomi dress had changed, with little evidence remaining of native attire except for ceremonial occasions. The Potawatomi were strongly encouraged to abandon their native language in favor of English, and the schools served as major catalysts in these efforts.

The boarding school was built to house around 100 students from the Potawatomi reserve and others living off-reservation. But the presence of a school on the reservation did not guarantee that every school-aged child actually attended. The OIA also operated boarding schools for particularly impoverished families. Some children simply could not afford to attend, but were eligible for enrollment in other government boarding schools

scattered across the central and north central plains. Chilloco in Oklahoma; Rapid City, Pierre, and Sisseton in South Dakota; Bismarck, Fort Totten, and Wahpeton, in North Dakota; and Genoa in Nebraska were all sites of OIA Indian boarding schools. For those students who showed promise beyond a basic high school education there was the Haskell Institute (later known as Haskell Indian Junior College), in nearby Lawrence, Kansas. In fact, from 1927 to 1935, all three Kansas reservations were administered by the Haskell Superintendent.

Medical treatment on the reservation was sometimes scarce or unavailable. Agency health records list details of the individual and/or family living in the home and health conditions were a constant concern for agents. Many reports indicate that the Potawatomi were frequently in poor health, often because of malnutrition and a lack of money to pay doctors. Health Survey records reveal that many Potawatomi were afflicted with trachoma, an eye infection that, left untreated, often led to blindness. Tuberculosis was another common medical problem, especially during the early reservation period.

Photographs attached to the Family Statistical and Health Survey records graphically depict the exterior conditions of Potawatomi homes. From available evidence and reports detailing the level of littering and abandonment, it seems the Potawatomi were not particularly concerned about the condition of their homes. Some lived in dwellings with broken windows and dirt floors. Frame homes had wells which were generally located close to the house, but placed where sewage and ground water could drain into the well and make it unsafe to drink. Livestock were often not kept in segregated pens or areas and this compounded sanitation and health problems. Not all

Potawatomi lived in such conditions, but for the most part, homes were not well maintained.

Federal programs are an integrated component in the history of relations between the OIA and the Native Americans. In the 1930's, the New Deal's Civilian Conservation Corps- Indian Division (CCC-ID) was one such program. This special Indian Division of the CCC was developed to provide work for tribal members during the Great Depression, through construction projects on reservations. And, the federal government continued to be paternalistic. Implementation of the Wheeler-Howard Act in the 1930's, with its commitment to the principle of self-determination compelled the government to pay greater attention to the issues involving local concerns and local control.

Progress has been difficult for the Potawatomi since they relocated to Kansas, as it has been for many tribes forcibly removed from their native lands. Slowly, the Potawatomi have found themselves increasingly assimilated into American culture. At the same time, many resident tribal members have energetically attempted to keep their native heritage alive. Today, the reservation remains intact. Its inhabitants are fully enfranchised citizens. Vestiges of the special relationship between the tribe and federal government remains in the form of entitlement's, education benefits, employment assistance programs, medical clinics, and special loan programs.

## **Conclusion**

The record of the administration of Potawatomi affairs by the government and its agents survives as evidence of official policy for the tribe. The actions reflected in the record were philosophically based on Thomas Jefferson's vision of the Agrarian Dream.<sup>34</sup> The Agrarian Dream was intended for the masses of the dominant culture, later incorporated into official policies affecting Indian affairs, and became an integral factor in subsequent tribal affairs. Surviving records support this view. Annual reports and the numerous correspondence files of agents for the Prairie Band, contain a substantial number of individual items in which the administrator's opinions are clearly expressed. Agents consistently expressed concern for the tribe. They were committed to helping the people progress, to become educated, industrious, independent, and to assimilate into white culture. Their hopes for the people were firmly rooted in Jeffersonian principles. The tribe would evolve from the extended tribal family into individual nuclear families, owning small family farms created by allotments. The agents led the effort to educate the tribe, adults and children. This education, albeit heavily vocational in emphasis, was based on the public education model and was Jeffersonian in concept, as was the attention given to agricultural science.

The course of national development in the Nineteenth Century saw its ultimate manifestation in the 160-acre homestead then offered to the individuals. Evidence suggests that the OIA officially was not out to disenfranchise the tribes but assist them in finding their place alongside other citizens of the United States. Citizenship, the final component in the greater plan, was offered to those ready to assume their status as individuals, rather than as members of a tribal collective.

The historical experience of the Potawatomi is complex; it is not one-dimensional, but multifaceted. These people forfeited much, but not everything, in an era when many tribes were removed yet again onto reservations in Oklahoma. The Potawatomi tenaciously retained their land in Kansas, although on a much reduced level. This land has proved to be among some of the richest farm land in Kansas.

The promise of prosperity exists, but remains an elusive goal. This much is certain: the Potawatomi's evolution as a people continues. What form this ongoing saga may take in the future is unclear. The documentary record of their experience on the reservation in Kansas has been preserved and prepared for further research and analysis.

**61A. ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY:** The Potawatomi Agency for the Prairie Potawatomi reservation of Kansas traces its origins to a Treaty of June 5, 1846, concluded near Council Bluffs, Iowa, that set aside 576,000 acres of land in the so-called "Indian Territory" west of the Mississippi, land that today is located in the State of Kansas. Movement of the tribe into the territory had actually begun some years earlier under provisions of other treaties concluded in the mid-1830's. Tribes relocated to the Indian Territory originally fell under the administration of the St. Louis Superintendency, a field office of the Office of Indian Affairs (OIA), that was succeeded by the Central

Superintendency in 1851. The Potawatomi reservation was intended to be a new homeland for the tribe where, removed from their ancestral homeland, conflict with white settlers might be avoided, and, a new way of life might be pursued.

A general migration of Potawatomi had been in progress for a number of years. At the time of first contacts with Europeans, circa 1640-70, the Potawatomi were situated around the Great Lakes in what would become the States of Michigan and Wisconsin. The largest concentration of Potawatomi was near the present city of Green Bay, Wisconsin, the center of their historic range. The Potawatomi were a typical woodlands tribe belonging to the Algonquian linguistic family and were most closely related to the Chippewa and Ottawa tribes.

The advance of European settlement resulted in ever increasing encroachment on Indian land and the inevitable conflict between the Potawatomi and white settlers, and with other tribes as well. During the War of 1812, the tribe actively sided with the British against the United States, an act that influenced the emergence of Indian policies regarding the Potawatomi and numerous other tribes living east of the Mississippi River. Removal and relocation clauses were principle elements of treaties that systematically relocated several dozen tribes to the new territory acquired as a result of the Louisiana Purchase. In the years prior to the official removal of the Potawatomi from the "Old Northwest," some sub-bands of Potawatomi had moved into present day Indiana, and others to the vicinity of Council Bluffs, Iowa. However, during the mid-1830's the main body of the tribe headed for Kansas, settling first among the Kickapoo in northeastern Kansas. Thereafter the Kansas Potawatomi were referred to as the "Prairie Potawatomi" or "Prairie Band."

In 1846, the tribe settled on their reservation as provided in a Treaty of June 5, 1846. In this new land they would pursue a new life as farmers, and move in the direction of assimilation into white society. The reserve was carved out of the eastern portion of former Kansa Indian reservation land straddling both sides of the Kansas River immediately west of the Kickapoo and Shawnee reserves. The establishment of the Potawatomi Agency coincided with the establishment of the Central Superintendency, in 1851, ushering in a new era of administration of Indian affairs for Potawatomi, and a multitude of other tribes living in Kansas.

Within a few years Kansas became the center of sectional controversy and strife over the Free-State issue following the passage of the Kansas-Nebraska Act. The opening of portions of the territory for white settlement quickly led to open warfare between pro- and anti-slavery settlers who moved onto lands that not long before had been reserved for Indian tribes. Civil War in Kansas was shortly followed by Civil War between the Northern and Southern states. For the Potawatomi, the dynamics of politics, expansion and settlement had a direct bearing on their future. Kansas, admitted to the Union as a Free State, fundamentally changed the status of "Indian Kansas," and this development affected the evolution of the Potawatomi Agency and the eventual reduction to its present size and profile.

The Potawatomi Agency was assigned to the Central Superintendency in 1851. When this authority was abolished in 1870, the Potawatomi Agency was reassigned to the Northern Superintendency, which was likewise abolished on June 30, 1876. At that time the Potawatomi Agency became an independent field installation that reported directly to the OIA and its Commissioner in Washington, DC. Many changes occurred during the years that the reservation existed under the Central Superintendency; the most significant being the allotment of land to individual Potawatomi out of the Greater Potawatomi lands held in severalty by the Tribe. This resulted in the drastic reduction of the original 576,000 acre reservation to an eleven square mile tract on 77,357 acres located in the center of present day Jackson County, Kansas. Attempts were made to encourage or persuade the remaining Prairie Potawatomi to relocate, once again, to a new reservation in the "Indian Territory" of Oklahoma. Fierce resistance on the part of the tribe thwarted this effort, securing for them a permanent, albeit much smaller reservation in Kansas.

Only three other reservations out of the numerous Kansas Indian Reserves would survive, these being the Iowa and Sac and Fox reservations (collectively known as the Great Nemaha Agency.) In 1882, the Great Nemaha and Potawatomi Agencies were administratively unified under a single agent.. This arrangement continued until 1903, at which time the Potawatomi Agency was divided into a Potawatomi Agency for the Potawatomi Indians and a Kickapoo Agency for the Kickapoo, the Iowa and Sac and Fox. In 1919, they were again combined and referred to as the Kickapoo Agency, but in 1921, the name was changed to Potawatomi Agency. From 1927 through 1935 the Potawatomi Agency was consolidated with the Haskell Institute. In 1950, Potawatomi Agency was redesignated as the Potawatomi Area Field Office, and, since 1964, administration has fallen under the authority of the Horton Agency, located on the eastern edge of the Kickapoo reservation in the town of Horton, Kansas. Mayetta has generally been recognized as the traditional headquarters for the Potawatomi Agency although other headquarter locations have included, Rossville, Hoyt, St. Mary's, Nadeau, Horton, and Lawrence, Kansas.

Administration of Indian affairs on a typical reservation affects the lives of the tribe under its jurisdiction in a variety of ways. Supervision, guidance and programs provided to the Potawatomi generally fall under several significant administrative categories that include: education, health and welfare, lands (or land management), trust activities, tribal resources, and Indian services. The allotment process and land management programs are documented among various records series, and permeate the correspondence of agents (later called superintendents.) Entitlements in the form of annuities were another significant administrative responsibility of the agent and administrative staff. Disbursement of funds and even the approval of most purchases by resident Indians had to be approved by the Agent. Agricultural policy was administered by an agency official called the "Indian Farmer" whose authority extended to the approval of purchases of livestock, equipment and decisions regarding the planting of crops. Managing the affairs of the Potawatomi people require an administrative establishment roughly comparable to a county-sized government authority.

The period after 1878 that lasted well into the 1930's was the "golden age" of the Indian reservation, if it is appropriate to refer to reservation life in such terms. In explanation, OIA operations, during that period, was very systematic, and many programs were run like bureaucratic institutions. There was much similarity in reservation administration and operation of schools, the Indian warehouses, and, in the interaction between the tribes and the Office of Indian Affairs, which, since 1947 was renamed the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA).

For the Potawatomi people, formerly a typical woodland tribe (whose way of life was chiefly supported by hunting, fishing and limited gathering), life in Kansas was primarily dependent on agriculture and animal husbandry. Most occupations of tribal members could be directly associated with such work. Education programs, heavily oriented towards vocational training, were developed for the children and the adult population of the Prairie Potawatomi. Mission schools, located near cities of St. Mary's and Topeka were operated by Jesuit Catholics and the Baptists, respectively. The Agency operated the Potawatomi Boarding school, and, the Kickapoo Training School. The combined administration of the Potawatomi and Great Nemaha Agencies (a reserve for the remaining Iowa, Sac and Fox Indians), and the remnant of the Kickapoo reserve provided logical unification in Indian education, which included day schools for the young on each reservation. In the near vicinity to the three agencies was the Haskell Institute which, from 1927-35 administered the Potawatomi Agency.

Progress for the Prairie Band has paralleled that of many other tribes. The trauma of dispossession, acceptance of new cultural habits, and working under a capitalist economic system has been difficult; the evidence of these difficulties is documented among surviving records that include health surveys, police record books, family survey sheets, and statistical data that reveal economic problems, alcoholism, living conditions and many other personal details about the resident population. Supporting information permeates the correspondence of agents and superintendents.

The evolution of Indian policy is evident in the administration of various programs created to aid the progress of the tribe. Leases and contracts of various types, Civilian Conservation Corps-Indian Division (CCC-ID) projects, education benefits, and employment programs have been the hallmark of the 20th century. The Wheeler-Howard Act (also known as the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934,) marked a new era of American Indian policy, the most major significant adjustments since general allotment. The Wheeler-Howard Act was largely inspired by the efforts of Indian Commissioner John Collier and his efforts to give Indians a greater degree of self-determination. But, the Bureau of Indian Affairs administration continues to affect the lives of the Potawatomi people. The evolution of the OIA and BIA has paralleled the administration of the Potawatomi reservation of Kansas which, as of 1999, continues to function under the supervisory authority of the Horton Area Field Office.

Records in the inventory are organized along un-official but functional lines that group records series under broad BIA program activities. A distinct body of Great Nemaha

Agency records have been identified among the holdings, and these have been segregated and described as a related sub-inventory with this project. A similar distinction has been determined for the records of the CCC-ID, and Potawatomi tribal charters. There are approximately 95 linear feet of records dated between 1861-1869.
