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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

The Nature of the Study

This study has as its main objective a detailed analysis of how the space is divided among the various types of news printed in Kansas high school newspapers. It also includes a study of the more mechanical items of the paper such as the frequency of publication, the size of the staff, the width of columns, and the length of the columns. This is done primarily to show the wide variation and the lack of uniformity in the purely mechanical parts of the papers.

The Purpose of the Study

The purpose of this study is to determine, if possible, just what the Kansas high school newspaper is, and how it devotes its space to the various types of news. The writer hopes that this study will serve as a measuring stick and means of comparison for the various high school papers of the state.

The Source of Data

The entire amount of information in this survey came from an analysis of the papers themselves. In no way was the questionnaire method used.

Letters were written to various Kansas high schools asking for four different issues of their papers for the 1933-1934 school year. Papers from thirty-four schools were received, making a total of 136 issues.

Method of Procedure

First, the following information was gathered about each paper: the number, the length, and the width of the columns; the frequency of publication; the number of pupils on the staff; and the names of the press associations of which the paper was a member. In these respects the four issues of each paper were the same, with the exception of the fact that the size of the staff sometimes varied in the second semester from what it was during the first semester.

The four issues of each paper were then analyzed separately, the number of column-inches for each issue being measured and recorded for the following types of news: advertising, athletics, book reviews, alumni news, columnists writing, debate, dramatics, editorials, educational news, exchange, feature stories, grade school news, general school news, Girl Reserve, Hi-Y, jokes and humorous writings, music, news of general interest (excluding school news), poems, personals, religious news, scholarship recognition, society, activities of the teachers, who's who or campus personalities, and finally miscellaneous news.

With this arrangement of classification the complete information for any paper could be found on one sheet of paper.

Definition of Terms

In all probability there are only two items used throughout this study which may puzzle the reader; these are the terms em and column-inch.

An em is a printer's measurement which is equal to one-sixth of an inch. For example, when it is said a column is thirteen ems wide it is the same as saying the column is two and one-sixth inches wide.

A column-inch is one column wide and one inch long.

Presentation of Data

In Chapter II the data gathered from the analysis of the papers are analyzed and discussed.

In Chapter III the whole study is briefly summarized.

CHAPTER II

The Results of the Study Presented

Upon examination of Table I it will be noticed that a majority of issues, used in this survey, were printed during the months of November, December, January, and February. This is probably due to the fact that the request for papers was sent out during the first week of February; it was the natural inclination for the schools to send those papers which were the nearest to the current date of issue. However, the distribution is wide enough to permit practically all the activities of the school to be well enough underway to receive publicity.

Table II shows the wide range in the size of the paper as far as the length of columns is concerned. The length range is from 9-10 inches to 19-20 inches. In Table II, as is in all other tables, only whole numbers were used. For example, papers whose columns were 16 3/4 inches long were counted as 17 inches. This is especially true in all tables from Table VII on. In every instance fractions were counted in totaling the column-inches for any type of news in any single issue, but when the four totals for any type of news were added only whole numbers were used. For example, the tally for athletics in paper "A" may have been 70 1/8 inches for the first issue; 75 7/8 the second issue; 72 1/4 the third; and 76 3/4 for the fourth. In totaling these to determine the total column-inches devoted to athletics for the four issues only the nearest whole numbers, such as 70, 76, 72, and 77, were used.

Table III shows that all but three of the papers are four, five, or six columns wide.

The frequency of publication is another interesting item. Table IV shows that sixteen papers are bi-weekly publications, while five papers made no indication.

It is interesting to note that, in spite of the depression, the weekly and bi-weekly publications predominate; while there was only one tri-weekly and no monthly publications.

the papers. It is evident, upon examination of the table, that some papers were members of more than one association, while twelve made no indications or were affiliated with none. Although it is not shown in the table the Blue Eagle was perched in the mast head of one paper.

For those who are opposed to school papers on the grounds that enough pupils do not get a change to participate; let them examine Table VI.

Only one paper, the B. H. S. Life of Beloit, ran no advertising in any of the four issues. The Sun Dial devoted 26.36 per cent of the total space to advertising, which corresponds with the average percentage for all papers combined: see Table XXXIII.

All thirty-four papers devoted some space to athletics. The Patriot devoted 15.06 per cent of its total space to athletics. This most nearly corresponds to the average percentage for all papers combined which was 15.05: see Table XXXIII.

The term athletics, as used in this study, includes not only athletics, but also physical education for both men and women.

Twenty-six papers devoted some space to alumni news. The Topeka High School World devoted 1.41 per cent of its space to alumni news. This most nearly corresponds to the average percentage for all papers combined which was 1.30; see Table XXXIII.

Thirty papers devoted some space to columnist's writings. The Salina H. S. News devoted 7.82 per cent of its total space to columnist's writings. This most nearly corresponds with the average percentage for the thirty-four papers combined which was 7.81: see Table XXXIII.

CHAPTER III

Summary and Recommendations

The results of this survey may briefly be summed up as follows:

- 1. Enough pupils participate in publishing a school paper to warrant establishing the paper on an equal basis with other extracurricular activities.
- 2. On the whole the papers are exceptionally neat in appearance, and well printed; indicating they were put out in a well equipped shop by experienced workmen.
- 3. The per cent of the total column-inches devoted to any type of news declines very gradually; indicating more or less uniformity.
- 4. Advertising and athletics receive more space than any other items.
- 5. Advertising, athletics, columnist's writings, and general school news compose sixty per cent of the total space of all papers combined.
- 6. Athletics receive more publicity through the school paper than all the other extra-curricular activities combined.
- 7. Most advertising was of the display type.
- 8. Only one paper of the thirty-four studied carried no advertising.
- 9. Religious news received less space than any other type analyzed.
- 10. Only one paper carried a regular educational column.
- 11. "Dirt Columns" predominate in the field of columnist's writings.
- 12. Girl Reserves tend to receive more publicity than does the Hi-Y.
- 13. Music, debate, and dramatics receive approximately the same amount of publicity.

- 14. As a rule, the smaller papers tend to devote more space to personal items than do the larger papers.
- 15. Editorials, while only receiving 5.18 per cent of the total space of all papers combined, appeared in 135 out of 136 issues.
- 16. With the exception of some of the jokes, nearly all the news printed in the papers may be directly traced back to school activities, affairs, or personalities.
- 17. The number of exchange items run in the papers is small.
- 18. Many papers ran the dates of birthdays of the pupils.
- 19. A few papers used colored stock for special occasions.
- 20. The vast majority of the papers analyzed were four pages in size.
- 21. Most papers ran school calendars; these were all classified under general school news.
- 22. With the exception of C.W.A. and P.W.A. news, no news of national character appeared in the papers.
- 23. Only the larger papers tended to use cuts. Mats were used in practically all papers.
- 24. As an economy measure, many high school papers have been discontinued, substituting a column in the local paper.

Recommendations

1. As a training activity, in an educational sense, the author believes the papers are serving this purpose well. He would, however, recommend as wide a variation of news as possible. As a training activity the author believes, the papers will be best serving this purpose by permitting the members of the staff as wide an experience with the different types of newspaper writing as possible.

- 2. The make-up of the 136 issues included in this study ranges from good to poor. The author would recommend that more time and effort be placed on this feature of the paper.
- 3. The editing of the issues, used in this study, for the most part is good. Nevertheless, there is always room for improvement. The author suggests, for the benefit of the pupils, that the advisors stress the importance of good editing at every opportunity.
- 4. The author recommends that more space be spent on "educational news": see Table XV, page 19. It is heartily recommended that more papers follow the example of the North Star, the paper of Wichita High School North. Here a portion of a column is devoted weekly to the discussion of the most common difficulties pupils encounter in school. The column is primarily for the parents but is interestingly written and no doubt read by many pupils. The school paper affords an excellent opportunity to get this type of news and other interesting educational news to the parents. Far too few papers are taking advantage of the fact.
- 5. News concerning national affairs should receive more attention. Most pupils read no paper thoroughly except the school paper; a short column briefly summarizing the most important and interesting national events would be using the space wisely.
- 6. By far too large a proportion of the columnist's writings: see

 Table XI, page 15; are devoted to "dirt-columns." In most papers

 these columns are so poorly written that only those pupils who are

 closely associated with the instances discussed are able to get any
 thing from them. "Dirt-columns" should be cleverly enough written

 so that the style of writing attracts attention rather than the

 nasty remarks made.

There is quite a distinct tendency for the high school papers to be patterned after college papers. The type of news and the style of writing closely resembles that of college papers. This is a purely subjection observation and comes from the author's experience rather than from any objective evidence gathered from this survey.
