KANSAS TOWNS

The names of Kansas towns have diverse origins. Many have Indian names. The Wichita were an Indian tribe and the name translates "painted faces." There is confusion about the arigins of same town names. Havanna was nomed after an Indian tribe, not the city in Cubo. Spelling errars also contribute to the confusion. Cubo was not named for the country in which Hovanna is located, but for a pioneer whose name was spelled with a "K" not o "C." One town agreed to be named ofter the winner of a paker game. It became Cawker City. While settlers of one lown argued about its name, one disgusted resident declared, "by jingo, we'd better decide the name of the town." Jingo is in Miami County.

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In the 1850's some settlers from the Albany, New York area came to Nemaha County and the town of Albany, Konsas was born. In 1882 the post office moved to Sabetho and except for the limestone school sitting on a hill, most of Albany was hauled away. For about eighty years people forgat that John Brown spent his last night in Kansas in Albany and that slaves leaving Missouri on the underground railraad stapped there too. But in 1965 people from neighboring towns got together and formed the Albany Historical Society. Volunteers moved in historic hauses, built metal sheds to house antique cars and farm machinery, added a blocksmith shop, log cobin and an old post office. They turned the old schoolhouse into a museum. Albany, Kansos is no longer o ghost town.

From PLAINS TALK

In the autumn of 1870 a small group of colonists from Wisconsin settled in Coneburg, Konsos. By June of 1871 the moin line of the Atchison, Topeka, and the Santa Fe roilrand had reached the townsite. The directors of the railroad, while troveling ocross Kansas, stapped in Coneburg. Among the visitors were F.H. Peabody of Bostan, treasurer of the Santa Fe. In his honor the name of the town was changed from Coneburg to Peabody. In 1874 Mr. Peabody presented ta the town a librory building, furniture, and a collection of 2,000 boaks for free public use. Thus Peabody hos the distinction of having the first free public library in the state of Kansas. The original library building has been preserved and naw serves as the Peabody Library Historical Museum.

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
